The recorded observations show a consistent pattern. Each result is connected to the question without turning correlation into certainty.

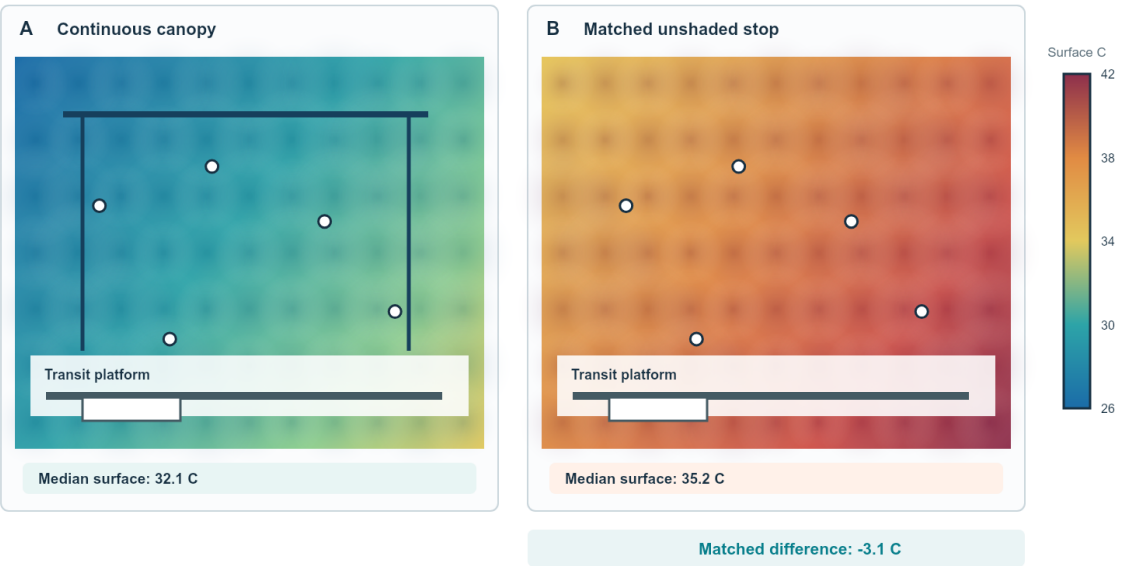
Methods

Measure	Value	Interpretation
A	-3.1	The result moves in the expected direction and remains within the stated measurement limits.
