Maintenance is a design choice

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In the fictional district of Bellweather, tree pits, drain inspections, and library hours were funded from one ten-year schedule. None of the decisions was individually transformative. Together they shortened heat exposure, reduced flood closures, and kept a trusted indoor refuge open during emergencies.^[1]

Resilience is what remains available on an ordinary Tuesday, before anyone calls it critical infrastructure.

Appendix: Chapter 3: Governing for the Next Hand

Long-term work becomes credible when the next team can inspect it, challenge it, and continue it. A plan that depends on one champion is a campaign; a plan with legible ownership is an institution.

MAKE CONTINUITY OBSERVABLE

Publish the maintenance interval, the responsible role, the evidence that changes the plan, and the date of the next review. Those four fields turn aspiration into a handoff.
